Half Moon Bay Cruise - Labor Day Weekend by Kathryn Munn Hodgkins



Saturday, August 30, Bundled against a chill fog, seven intrepid Islander 36's set sail for Half Moon Bay. Departing from the south tower of the Golden Gate Bridge at 9:00 a.m., the cruisers were Noncents (Jack and Sandy Thompson), Mischief (Charles and Kathryn Hodgkins), Evanescence (Smokey Stover and Larry Reinstra), Woodbine (Ron and Karen Damsen), Dreamcatcher

(Vern Verling, Cheryl Lawson, and boat dog Jack), and *Dayna Marie* (Glenn Zimmerman, Joe Weathers, and David Scardigly) and *Mustang* (Joseph Krensavage and James Roten).

Riding out with the tail end of the ebb tide, the trip across the potato patch was almost painless. Boat captains picked anywhere from 2-4 miles out for the easy run down the coast, which proved a sweet close reach in steady winds of 8-10 knots and seas of 4-6 feet. The coastline was visible, albeit a little blurry from the fog, all the way to Half Moon Bay. Just past Point Montera the wind died and engines fired up with crews on sharp lookout for crab pots.

At Half Moon Bay *Mischief* staked out a spot with an easy row to the beach and in short order a raft-up of six alternating Freeports and Gurney-designed Islanders formed. The result prompted one visitor to ask in what year the "big ones" were built. *Dreamcatcher* swung on a hook close by, visiting frequently by sea kayak. Boats and rafts spun around 180 degrees over the cycle of the tide, so our raft used a stern anchor to avoid a nasty bow anchor wrap.

After hooks were down and foul weather gear stowed, drinks and snacks started up at 4:00 on *Noncents* and *Woodbine* followed by a potluck on the roomy *Noncents*. The eats were plentiful and yummy. Joseph Krensavage's friend Jeanne drove in for the evening and brought pizza. Who knew you could heat up 3 large pizza boxes at once in one Islander 36 oven? The party-hardy crowd on *Dayna Marie* set out just after anchoring for the HMB nightlife and returned to an early lights out raft later that evening.

Mustang left Sunday morning for an early return. The coastal fog hung around all day with glimpses of sun in the late afternoon. The day featured dinghy rides around the bay to visit friends, trips to shore for walks around the harbor, and visits from neighboring boats. A happy crowd of 250 sailors enjoyed a BBQ chicken dinner, a live band, and plenty of beer. The evening was capped off with fireworks. Islander 36 Nationals October 4-5

It has been discussed over the past couple of years that it would be nice to have a race among the Islander 36 boats where everyone would be invited - cruisers, racers, and those in between. We wanted a race that would not count for the season totals regarding the local fleet and would include folks from locations near and far. Just as we had hoped, I heard from Islander owners afar--in Florida, Ohio, Washington, Oregon and Southern California, who planned to attend as volunteer crews aboard local boats, but in the end business demands, family concerns, and the flu reduced out of town participants to a Southern California representative.

What started off as an unnamed independent regatta with titles ranging from the Galactic Championships to the Pacific Coast Championships ended up being called the Islander 36 Nationals. Boats racing were limited to Islander 36's, using working sails with jibs no larger than 135's and no spinnakers. Paul Tara, I-36 Measurer, was on hand Friday night with assistants to measure boats.

The boats started arriving on Friday October 3 at San Francisco Yacht Club. By evening the entire guest dock was filled with beautiful Islanders. A skippers' meeting was held Saturday morning to go over the sailing instructions and by 1100 that afternoon the line was crowded with Islanders--a sight that hasn't been seen in the Bay area for over a decade. Through Mike and Daphne Dickson's efforts, the I-36 Fleet has been building the past few years and put 17 boats on the line this season. This regatta was a reward for their efforts.

The courses were short, the wind around 15 knots and the sky was overcast to clearing. Two races were held on Saturday with TOM CAT outsailing all of us. Sadly TOM CAT and 2 other Islanders became a bit confused about the race instructions and went through a restricted finish line. TOM CAT was protested as was BLUE STREAK by one of the racers but the protest was disallowed because of a problem with not flying a red flag (the disallowment is still to be resolved). Because the Islander fleet is not a litigious one by nature, no one else filed. I think, many of us who saw the infractions believed the one protest would take care of the problem.

Barry and Sylvia upon learning the protest was not allowed pulled TOM CAT from the first race. I don't think SPINDRIFT was even aware of their infraction, as they didn't stay over at the club between races on Saturday night. I'm sure in the end it will all work out. Everyone will do the correct and fair thing.

On Sunday the fleet decided to sail one race as originally planned. By 1100, there we were once again, with lighter winds and clearer skies prevailing, but once again on a line that was filled with beautiful Islanders.

The course set up for us was much shorter than we normally race on the Bay, so the boats were very close to each other in every race. Sunday was no different.

TOM CAT once again ended up leading us all around the course and finishing first. PILOT came in a distant second with WINDWALKER and rest of the fleet crawling up my transom.

I want to thank everyone for coming and everyone who wanted to come but couldn't. Thanks MIDNIGHT SUN for not being able to make the regatta (just kidding). Peter Szasz led the fleet all year long and would have taken the season prize except for missing Vallejo.

And I especially want to single out TOM CAT'S Barry and Sylvia Stompe. In the end TOM CAT got all of us with great tactics, beautiful crew work and fantastic boat speed but because of their fine sportsmanship they relinquished the first place trophy to PILOT. The crew of PILOT had a great weekend, but she was clearly outsailed by TOM CAT.

The reason we've stayed with our Islander 36 for so many years was because of the great people that own these boats and the fair racing we have found, for the most part, in the Bay Area.
